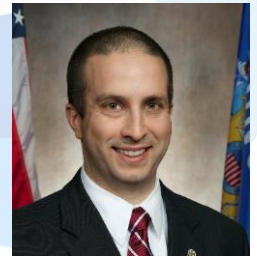
Dr. Nathaniel Chin is an associate professor in the Department of Medicine and Division of Geriatrics and Gerontology. Dr. Chin sees patients in the UW Health Memory Clinic where he also serves as the Associate Program Director. His clinical focus is on the early identification of cognitive impairment and the development of a holistic approach to care post-diagnosis. He is the medical director of the WI Alzheimer's Disease Research Center and the Wisconsin Registry for Alzheimer's Prevention Study. His research focuses on understanding the perceptions and implications of biomarker disclosure as well as the effect of addressing modifiable risk factors. He has created over 150 podcasts on AD research and caregiving topics under his podcast called Dementia Matters.

Mike Austin is the program manager of the Abuse in Later Life Program at the Wisconsin Department of Justice. Mike has led departmental efforts across multiple Attorneys General to better coordinate and support professionals across Wisconsin who serve victims of elder abuse. Those efforts have included the creation of the Attorney General's Task Force on Elder Abuse, developing legislative proposals to respond to elder abuse, creation of the Wisconsin Elder Abuse Hotline, training multidisciplinary partners on elder abuse, and the development of the statewide elder abuse awareness campaign – Respect your Elder, Report Abuse.
